BIOGRAPHY

THE BACH READER, edited by Hans Daniel and Arthur Mendel. \$6.00. Norton. All professional and amateur musicians and music lovers will be grateful for this volume, which is unique in the literature about the great master. It "contains all the surviving sources of any importance from which our knowledge of Bach's life and reputation has been drawn"—church records, personal letters, professional correspondence, stray poems attributed to Bach, cortemporary reviews and "feature stories," and so on. At the end are a great many useful bibliographical notes.

HOME TO INDIA, by Santha Rama Rau. \$2.50. Harper. After ten years spent in English schools and vacationing in a number of European capitals, sixteen-year-old Santha Rama Rau found herself strangely out of touch with her own country and people when she returned to India in 1939. During the two-year period which her book covers, Miss Rau met government and diplomatic officials, villagers, and young intellectuals of various shades of thought; she learned to fit herself once more into the pattern of a Brahmin household — to accept its age-old customs and traditions. Most important of all, she became aware of her own place and responsibility in a new India, which was neither Eastern nor Western. This is a simple story told with perception and humor, of the problem of readjustment which many young Indian people, educated abroad, must be ready to face.
