Your Horoscope

Those who have received horoscope readings from Miss Carter will find a number of sections explained below. Readings including all of your own planetary positions will appear weekly in the next few issues of ARGOSY.

Sections previously published, which you may have missed, will be repeated.

Section 215. Mercury.

THIS planetary position tends to make the individual born under it changeable and versatile. You would have been given an increased tendency to scatter your energies. The position, in itself, is not strong enough to dominate your chart, and if other testimony points to conservatism its influence will not be greatly apparent. Frequently, however, those who come into the world under this vibration have some tendency to be unreliable, their variable mental attitude making it difficult to predict their reaction to any situation. The position should have given you a degree of fondness for literature and a measure of studiousness. It would also have increased the brilliance of your mentality. It is quite likely that the tendency to occupy yourself with several things at the same time is present in your make-up; this should be restrained as much as possible. Unless born under very conservative birth signs, you may find it hard to tie yourself down to a routine task.

Section 274. Uranus.

ROM an astrological standpoint this is very significant. The planet tends toward the unconventional and rebellious, to a considerable extent. That influence is heightened by its position in this sign. Unless there are strong counteracting influences in your chart, you are very much inclined to be impatient of restraint and resentful of conventions. Astrologers of olden times felt it was not a favorable position for harmonious marriage, and might cause fluctuation in fortune, particularly in earlier years of life. According to astrological rules it is a very good position for a public career, although hindrances and social annoyances might come about as a result of it. It is not unusual for those who were born under this influence to have some tendency to be fickle. The probabilities are that you make very strong friends and equally strong enemies. One who is affected by this vibration should avoid an appearance of unconventionality to as great an extent as possible.

Section 228. Venus.

AN astrologer of some ancient civilization would have called this an indication that you were quite likely to benefit through marriage and, more than is usual, through your parents. Also that it suggests that you could benefit financially through some occupation connected with water more readily than in something far removed from that element. According to astrological rules, however, it is an influence which sometimes delays marriage and frequently those who come under its influence experience obstacles in that connection which come about through difference in age or position. The position is one which points to a considerable degree of emotionalism and you are quite sentimental unless other testimony in your chart is of a strongly contrary nature. Of course a cold and wholly intellectual birth sign would lessen the effect of this influence to a considerable degree.

Section 273. Uranus.

AN astrologer of ancient times, were it possible for you to consult one, would have advised you to proceed with caution in any matter involving real estate. The probabilities are that you are very responsive to psychic vibrations. Possibly you do not realize the cause, but the result of this condition would be to make you

suddenly depressed or equally elated, without apparent cause. It will be advisable for you to consider your surroundings when you are depressed without reason. Unwholesome atmosphere, sordid environment or weather conditions would be quite injurious in their effect upon you. You will probably always be in a much better frame of mind when you are surrounded by pleasant people and conditions.

Section 219. Mercury.

PEOPLE born under this sign tend to make a marriage of the mind rather than of the heart. You are probably much more inclined toward intellectual activity than is usual. Unless other testimony in your chart is of an opposite nature, you prefer to work in collaboration or partnership with others, rather than to "play a lone hand." It has always been considered a favorable position for harmonious family relations, and while it would not, alone, assure such a state, it would certainly aid greatly in that connection. Both the sign and planet are considered intellectual in their influence, bestowing balanced judgment and a scientific mental attitude. You would probably have been given some natural ability to judge the value of merchandise, and those who receive the benefit of these vibrations to the fullest extent become splendid merchants.

Section 272. Saturn.

THE planetary position which this section considers is one that astrologers do not consider wholly fortunate in its influence over those affected. Ancient astrologers foresaw danger in confiding too fully in those with whom one was associated. The position points to the possibility of difficulty as a result of secret enemies and through trouble with inferiors. In the majority of cases, those born under this influence are their own worst enemies. It is an odd influence because, while it seems to bring about misfortune at times, those misfortunes are almost invariably the direct result of a mental attitude held by those affected by the position. You should take particular pains to cultivate a cheerful, optimistic mental attitude. The influence of this vibration would not be felt to any great extent if you were born under a birth sign which imparts strongly optimistic reactions, but unless that was the case you should watch for and guard against pessimism.

Section 224. Mercury.

THOSE born under this influence are apt to act from instinct rather than as a result of careful reasoning. It imparts tendencies which are the exact opposite of scientific. If you were born under other influences which gave you a scientific mental attitude, much of that quality may remain, but it was lessened by this vibration. You are magnanimous and just to a far greater extent than you would have been without this ray, and you are more even tempered than you would have been. It is a very fortunate position for success in imaginative writing, singing or public speaking. The position would not have had anything to do with the vocal organs directly, however, and in that connection would not aid one to become a singer, yet it is considered by astrologers to bestow other qualities which would greatly aid. It is a testimony pointing to trouble with education and possibly with brothers and sisters. You were given romantic sympathies by this position. Many people affected are incurably romantic at heart.
