# GREAT TOPICS—GREAT ISSUES

**PUBLIC ENEMIES—October 1998**—Samuel Francis compares the Mob and the managerial state, J.O. Tate exposes the American way of crime, Jerry Seper argues that the Mob is down but not out, Wayne Allensworth tracks the Russian Mafia in America, and Thomas Fleming wonders whether the modern state is a criminal profession.

**REBUILDING OUR SCHOOLS—September 1998**—Thomas Fleming argues that it takes a village to educate a child, Joyce Haws documents the judicial takeover of public schools, Rep. Greg Kaza examines the Michigan model of school-funding, and Lisa Graham Keegan and Lew Rockwell square off over school vouchers. Plus Douglas Wilson on why evangelical colleges aren't.

**LIFE: THE SACRED AND PROFANE—August 1998**—Thomas Fleming on the measure of life's worth, Harold O.J. Brown on the (misplaced) civility of pro-lifers, and Bill Murchison and Ernest van den Haag debate the right to die. Plus Chilton Williamson, Jr., on the suicide of the West and Samuel Francis on the deconstruction of America.

**SOVEREIGNTY FOR SALE? THE FREE TRADE DEBATE—July 1998**—Thomas Fleming on trade and treason, Patrick J. Buchanan sketches a course of action, John O'Sullivan explains the limits of Buchananism, and Alfred E. Eckes draws some lessons from the Asian meltdown. Plus a debate on Pat Buchanan's *The Great Betrayal*.

**U.S. GLOBAL HEGEMONY—June 1998**—Doug Bandow on finding foes in the post-Cold War era, James George Jastras on the demise of national interests, Justin Raimondo on Clinton's attempt to "wag the dog," and Denis Petrov on the real powerbrokers in Russia and America. Plus the lessons that Robert Taft could teach us today.

**WHO KILLED THE BOOK?—May 1998**—Tony Outhwaite exposes the book industry as a hothouse of goofiness, George Garrett and Clay Reynolds lament the decline of commercial publishing, Gregory McNamee highlights the state of the university press, and Gene Edward Veith sees Christian publishers in the thrall of Mammon. Plus three poems by Wendell Berry.

**EUROPEAN AMERICA—April 1998**—Thomas Fleming on the heart's geography, Jean Raspail on defending civilization, Scott P. Richert on the European roots of American life, and Samuel Francis on the other face of multiculturalism. Plus Roger L. Busbice on the Cajuns and Ben C. Toledano on Creole culture.

**FASCISM/ANTI-FASCISM—March 1998**—Thomas Fleming on the triumph of national socialism, Paul Gottfried on the politics of labels, Derek Turner on Jean-Marie Le Pen and the National Front, Tomislav Sunic on victimology as scholarship, and Peter Erickson on Ayn Rand and the welfare/warfare state. Plus Llewellyn H. Rockwell, Jr., on the criminal state.

**CAN THIS UNION BE SAVED?—February 1998**—Thomas Fleming on fighting the federal beast, Donald Livingston on secession and states' rights, William J. Quirk and Robert M. Wilcox on judicial tyranny and constitutional change, and John R. Stoeffler on judicial taxation. Plus Scott P. Richert on the fall of the right.

**PRIVATE JUSTICE—January 1998**—Thomas Fleming on the return of revenge, Michael Hill on justice in the Celtic world, Barry Baldwin on Albanian blood-feuds, Jeremy Black on government's monopoly on violence, and David Kopel on why owning a gun makes everyone safer.

**NATION UNDER GOD—December 1997**—Thomas Fleming praises intolerance, D. George Leech outlines a Christian foreign policy, William A. Donohue discusses anti-Catholicism (the last respectable bias), Llewellyn H. Rockwell, Jr., shows why the Christian right needs Econ. 101, and Harold O.J. Brown questions the ethics of the clergy.

**IDENTITY POLITICS—November 1997**—Thomas Fleming on race as the American religion, Samuel Francis on the witch hunts of Morris Dees, Jacob Neusner on secular Judaism, and Joseph Fallon on the politics of Hispanic identity. Plus Justin Raimondo on the black war on Asians in San Francisco, and Mark Tooley on the church burning hoax.
