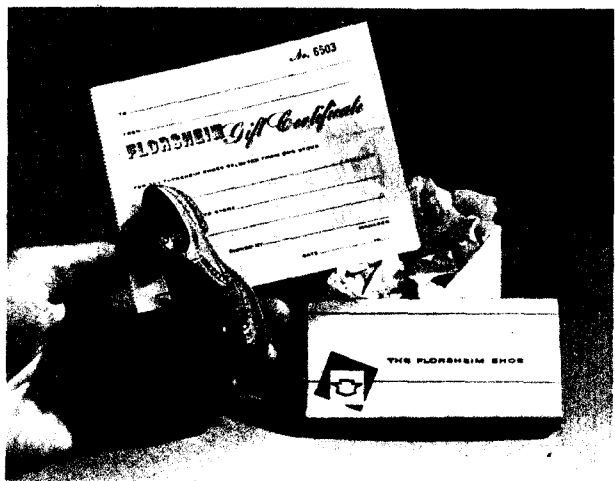


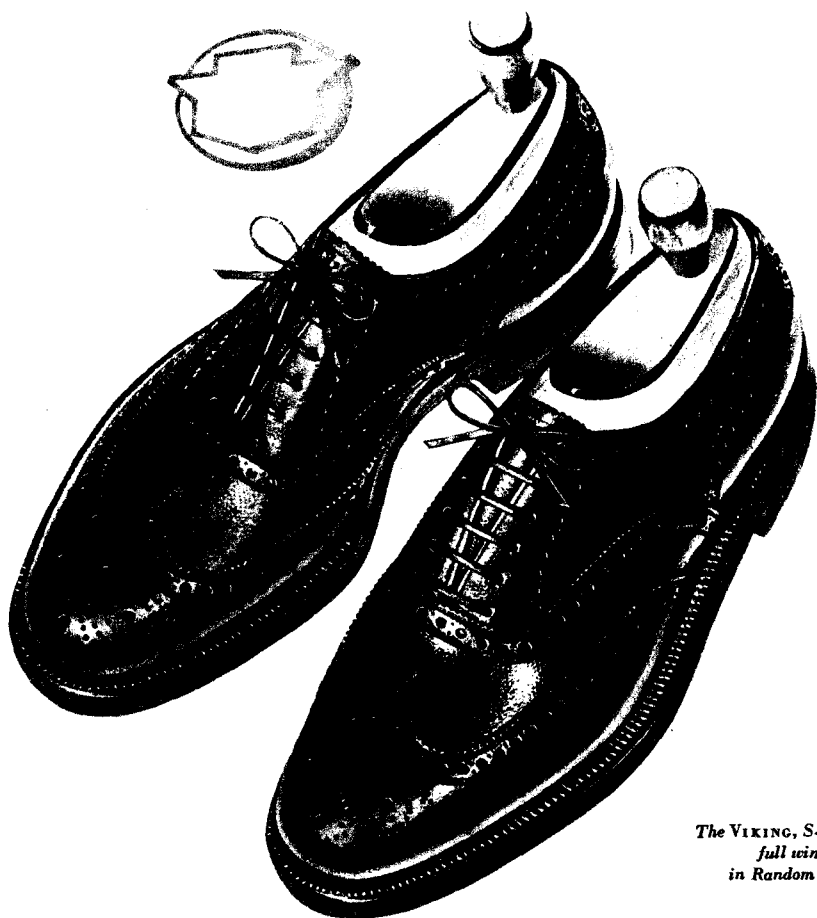

None of our business, of course, but we'd still like to know what Elizabeth and Philip said about us after they got home, took off their shoes and gathered around the fireplace with the family.

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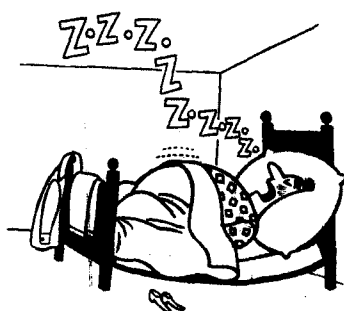

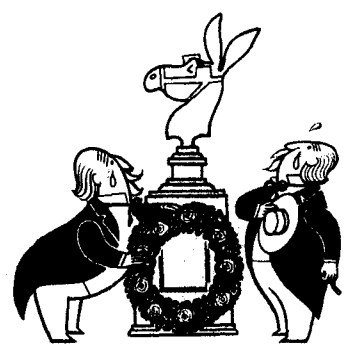
