One of the early volumes of the great Carnegie Endowment Social and Economic History of the War.

THE FUTURE OF THE INDO-BRITISH COMMONWEALTH. By J. C. Wedgwood. London: Theos. Publishing House, 1922.

An anaysis of contemporary issues by a well-known radical.

THE CRUMBLING OF AN EMPIRE. London: Indo-British Association, 1922, 100 pp.

Severe and well-documented indictment of British policy in India since 1916.

The Near East

NEAR EASTERN AFFAIRS AND CONDITIONS. By S. PANARETOFF. New York: Macmillan, 1922, 216 pp.

An exposition of Balkan history, politics and diplomacy from the standpoint of a scholarly Bulgarian.

LE KEMALISME DEVANT LES ALLIES. By MICHEL PAILLARES. Constantinople: Edition du Bosphore, Pera, 1922, 488 pp.

A Grecophile account of the Turkish Nationalist movement from 1919 to 1922.

DIPLOMATIE ET PRESSE DANS L'AFFAIRE GRECQUE. By S. COSMIN. Paris: Société Mutuelle d'Edition, 1921, 313 pp.

The story of events in Greece during the war expounded by a partisan of King Constantine.

THE TURK AND EUROPE. By G. GAILLARD. London: Murby, 1922, 408 pp. A translation of an important work.

Africa

L'AFRIQUE ET LA PAIX DE VERSAILLES. By E. ANTONELLI. Paris: Grasset, 1921, 258 pp.

A sketch of European colonial possessions in Africa in 1914, with a brief account of the war in Africa and the redisposition of African territory at the Peace Conference.

L'A RÉVOLUTION ÉGYPTIENNE. By M. LABRY. Paris: J. Vrin, 1922, 277 pp. An important work from the standpoint of a scholarly Egyptian nationalist.

THE DUAL MANDATES IN BRITISH TROPICAL AFRICA. By F. D. LU-GARD. London: Blackwood, 1922.

A fair discussion of social, economic and cultural, as well as administrative and diplomatic problems.

The Far East

ASIA AT THE CROSSROADS. By E. A. Powell. New York: Century, 1922, 369 pp.

A journalistic sketch of contemporary civilization and international problems in Japan, Korea, China and Philippines. Good popular introductory treatment.

THE PACIFIC TRIANGLE. By Sydney Greenbie. New York: Century, 1922, 402 pp.

A breezy survey of the geography, culture and problems of international relations in Australasia, China and Japan. The best section is that on Japan.

THE PROBLEM OF THE PACIFIC IN THE NINETEENTH CENTURY. By N. GOLOVIN. London: Glydendal, 1922, 256 pp.

This volume treats chiefly of military and naval problems, assuming Japanese aggression as inevitable owing to the increase in population. Japan can be checked, the author believes, only by the United States in alliance with regenerated Russia and China. It denounces the Washington Conference.

TRADING WITH ASIA. By F. R. Eldridge. New York: Appleton, 1921, 474 pp.

An important work on the resources, commerce and commercial policies of the Philippines and Eastern Asia.

THE WASHINGTON CONFERENCE. By R. L. BUELL. New York: Appleton, 1922, 461 pp.

The best general account of the Washington Conference to date. The author believes Chinese aspirations were defeated.

LA CONFERENCIA DE WASHINGTON Y EL PROBLEMA DEL PACIFICO. By A. Révész. Madrid: Biblioteca Internacional, 1922.

The Spanish view of the Conference and of diplomatic problems in the Pacific. It predicts an ultimate yellow alliance against the whites.

JAPAN AND THE UNITED STATES. By P. J. TREAT. Boston: Houghton, Mifflin, 1922, 283 pp.

An authoritative history of Japanese-American relations since 1853, pro-Japanese in its treatment of contemporary problems in the Far East.

JAPAN'S PACIFIC POLICY. BY K. K. KAWAKAMI. New York: Dutton, 1922, 380 pp.

A moderate apologia for Japanese policies at the Washington Conference, indicating their historic and diplomatic background. It contains reprints of useful documents.

LA CHINE ET LE JAPON POLITIQUES. By F. Challaye. Paris: Alcan, 1921, 323 pp.

A substantial work, strongest on Japan.

HISTOIRE GÉNÉRALE DE LA CHINE. By HENRI CORDIER. Paris: Geuthner, 1921, four vols., 574, 434, 428, 427 pp.

The most comprehensive and reliable history of China in any language, written by the foremost French authority on Chinese history.

CHINA AT THE CONFERENCE. By W. W. WILLOUGHBY. Baltimore: Johns Hopkins University Press, 1922, 419 pp.

By far the most valuable and authoritative presentation of Chinese problems at the Conference. The author was a technical adviser to the Chinese delegation.

RUSSIA IN THE FAR EAST. By L. PASVOLSKY. New York: Macmillan, 1922, 181 pp.

Important for the pre-revolutionary period, but naïve and uncritical in dealing with events since 1917.
