LIFE AND LETTERS OF WALTER H. PAGE. By B. J. HENDRICK. New York: Doubleday, 1922, two volumes, 436, 437 pp.

An important contribution to the first-hand history of the war.

DANISH-AMERICAN DIPLOMACY, 1776-1920. By S. J. M. P. FOGDALL. Iowa City: University of Iowa Press, 1922, 171 pp.

The first scholarly review of this subject available in the English language.

AMERICANISM, A WORLD MENACE. By W. T. COLYER. London: Labor Publishing Company, 1922, 178 pp.

A severe indictment of American chauvinism and present political and economic systems in the United States. It should be read by "Hundred Percenters."

UNDER FOUR ADMINISTRATIONS. By OSCAR STRAUS. Boston: Houghton Mifflin, 1922, 456 pp.

The interesting memoirs of a public-spirited American, containing much valuable material on the political and diplomatic problems of Eastern Europe and Turkey.

Some sidelights on America's participation in the World War, particularly as regards Russia and the Far East.

BIBLIOGRAPHIC SURVEY OF CONTEMPORARY SOURCES FOR THE ECONOMIC AND SOCIAL HISTORY OF THE WAR. By M. E. BULKLEY. Oxford: Clarendon Press, 1922, 648 pp.

A valuable guide to British sources for British events and conditions.

WOODROW WILSON AND THE WORLD SETTLEMENT. By RAY STANNARD BAKER. New York: Doubleday, 1922, three volumes, 432, 561, 508 pp.

The most complete account of the peace negotiations yet published in any language. While sympathetic with Mr. Wilson's policies, the work is primarily expository. The manuscript and the *New York Times* articles have been edited by technically equipped scholars prior to reprinting in this edition. The third volume contains a very complete collection of documentary material.

THE NEW CONSTITUTIONS OF EUROPE. By H. L. MCBAIN AND LINDSAY ROGERS. New York: Doubleday, 1922, 612 pp.

A timely work which includes the texts of the new constitutions and a brief analysis of the political principles and innovations involved.

AFTER THE PEACE. By H. N. BRAILFORD. New York: Seltzer, 1922, 158 pp.

Capitalistic imperialism is here arraigned by a leading English radical, who urges the adoption of thoroughgoing economic internationalism.

THE DECADENCE OF EUROPE. By F. NITTI. London: Fisher Unwin, 1923.

An angry indictment of present-day European politicians and all their works.

WHITHER FRANCE? WHITHER EUROPE? By JOSEPH CAILLAUX. Translated by HELEN BYRNE ARMSTRONG. New York: Knopf, 1923, 186 pp.

The former French Premier tries to answer the question: "How are we to adjust the political institutions founded by our fathers to the economic forces which have become our chaotic, all-powerful rulers?"

OLD EUROPE'S SUICIDE. By C. B. THOMSON. New York: Seltzer, 1922, 192 pp.

A well written work on secret diplomacy and the Paris settlement. The author predicts a general uprising against Europe's present régime, which he considers reactionary and reprehensible.

WESTERN EUROPE AND THE UNITED STATES. By E. M. PATTERSON. Philadelphia: Annals of the American Academy of Political and Social Science, Nov., 1922, 186 pp.

A valuable survey of current conditions in the chief European states, to which is appended a series of special articles by foreign experts.

OPPRESSED PEOPLES AND THE LEAGUE OF NATIONS. By NOEL BUXTON AND T. P. CONWIL-EVANS. London: Dent, 230 pp.

The authors survey the progress of national emancipation and advocate the extension of the mandatory system.

RECENT REVELATIONS ON EUROPEAN DIPLOMACY. By G. P. GOOCH. London: British Institute of International Affairs, 1923, 30 pp.

A résumé of the testimony of diplomats and soldiers regarding the causes of the war.

ENGLAND AFTER WAR. By C. F. G. MASTERMAN. London: Hodder and Stoughton, 1922, 215 pp.

A trenchant attempt to estimate the effect of the war on English society and culture.

BRITISH AND CONTINENTAL LABOR POLICY. By B. G. DE MONTGOMERY. London: Kegan Paul, 1922, 575 pp.

A thorough survey of present conditions and tendencies in Great Britain, France and the Scandinavian States, with particular emphasis on labor legislation.

SIR DOUGLAS HAIG'S COMMAND, 1915-1918. By A. B. DEWAR AND J. H. BORASTON. London: Constable, 1922, two volumes, 414, 375 pp.

A detailed appreciation which may profitably be compared with Gen. Bliss' article in *Foreign Affairs* for December and with an article by Major Gen. Sir George Aston in the forthcoming *Quarterly Review* (London).

MODERN FRANCE. By A. TILLEY. Cambridge: Cambridge University Press, 1922, 850 pp.

A voluminous and authoritative cooperative work describing diverse phases of the evolution of French culture since 1500.

FRANCE FACING GERMANY. By GEORGES CLEMENCEAU. New York: E. P. Dutton, 1922, 200 pp.

A collection of important speeches from the time of the Morocco crisis to the World War.

FRENCH PARTIES AND POLITICS. By R. H. SOLTAU. London: Milford, 1922, 80 pp.

A brief but excellent and up-to-date summary.

LA GUERRE DE 1914. COMMENT ON MOBILISA LES CONSCIENCES. By G. DEMARTIAL. Paris: Editions des Cahiers Internationaux, 1922, 325 pp.

A frank analysis of war-time propaganda and censorship in France.

BISMARCK'S DIPLOMACY AT ITS ZENITH. By J. V. FULLER. Cambridge: Harvard University Press, 1922, 380 pp.

A scholarly work based on the latest documents published by the German Foreign Office.
