## Contributors' Gallery

Emile Vandervelde, celebrated Belgian statesman, orator, and Socialist, was born at Ixelles, near Brussels, in 1866. He studied law at the University of Brussels and got his doctor's degree in social science in 1885. A year later he became associated with the Labor Party, and was soon its acknowledged leader. He first entered Parliament in 1894. The Encyclopædia Britannica in its account of Mr. Vandervelde states:

On the outbreak of the war, Vandervelde devoted himself to the problems of national defense, the liberation of his invaded country, and in August, 1914, was summoned to join the Government as Minister of State, later becoming a mem ber of the Cabinet. At the time of the peace negotiations and the signing of the Versailles Treaty he used his influence to obtain the insertion of labor clauses, relating especially to the eight-hour day. As Minister of Justice in the "Liberal-Catholic-Socialist" Cabinet formed after the war, Vandervelde effected great humanitarian and scientific reforms in the prison system. After the important successes achieved by the Labor Party at the general elections of 1925 he entered the "Socialist-Catholic-Coalition" Cabinet as Minister for Foreign Affairs and played an important part in negotiating the Locarno Pact in 1925 , which he signed on behalf of Belgium,
