## Center for Market Processes

The Center financially supports graduate students in several degree programs at George Mason University. Center students share a keen interest in learning to apply Austrian economics to problems in public policy, management, and cultural studies. The Center is affiliated with the Program on Social and Organizational Learning, an interdisciplinary academic unit of George Mason's College of Arts and Sciences. The Program was created to promote a greater understanding of how societies and organizations can use the dispersed and tacit knowledge of all of their members. Program faculty include Mark Addleson (management/economics), Brad Cox (software engineering), Jerry Ellig (industrial organization), Jack High (business history), Manuel Johnson (monetary economics), Tojo Joseph (organizational behavior), and Don Lavoie (comparative economic systems).

## Center Students
