≺HINK what it would be like to have your entire library chosen by another race—a race of giants, large, bland, and often supremely uninterested. You hint that you are interested in zoology, and you receive for Christmas a "Life of Goya" (because the pictures are so beautiful), and a card which says, "Merry Christmas from Aunt Minnie." That is the disadvantage under which most children labor. Few of them ever are allowed to pick out a book for themselves. What different nursery libraries we should have if they did!

Children who like fairy tales will be charmed with "The Golden Cockerel," by Elaine and Willy Pogany. This is a version of the Russian fairy tale from which the production of the Coq d'Or came. The pictures are splendid, full of color and action and with a robust quality rare in fairy tales.

A general favorite which will appeal particularly to the musical child is "Songs from Many Lands," compiled by Thomas
