Eudora's flesh didn't thrive on prayer: her soft dove's eyes went everywhere;


- and everywhere for a breathless second

IMPRESSIONS

UNLESS present portents are grossly in error, the long-standing ban on new recordings will be lifted before these observations appear in print. The irony of it all may be that the men who found their holiday season disrupted last year by emergency recording in anticipation of the ban may now find a similar situation in the wake of its removal.

If anyone can point out any way in which a year's cessation of recording has benefited either labor or management in this dispute, or any single way in which a concession of value has been wrung from one side or the other, I will be the first to agree that it served some useful purpose. The musicians are returning to work—if not immediately, whenever they do under a wage agreement no different from that which obtained before.

The manufacturers will pay a royalty of some sort into a welfare fund of some sort, exactly as they did before. It will not be administered by President Petrillo, but by a trustee acceptable to both labor and management. Since management is content with the status quo, and not much concerned with the spending of the money it pays into this fund, the probability is that it will continue to serve much the same function as it did before-as an evidence of Petrillo's interest in his unemployed duespayers-whether you explain it on grounds that are sociological, technicological, or merely illogical.

The only party to the dispute not represented in the settlement is the public. It has no voice in decisions though its outlay is the only factor concerned in the haggling. It is not consulted on the justice of a work cessation, though that cessation has taken a whole year from the recording span of Arturo Toscanini, deprived us of a host of performances which
