STRAUSS, EIEKTRA At last-the singers (FINAI, SCENE) 1509 . are too strong (this Royal Philharmonic opera noted for Oreh., chorus, soloists; voices drowned by Beecham.

A novel plan: Bible story set in movieradio technique, each section by diff. leading composer. Some of this is music of major importance; surprising dram. continuity, considering radically diff. styles. Well-performed exc. chorus.
The incomparably pure voice (Messiah, Elijah recordings) in Bach, Handel, Haydn, done in British oratorio manner (big orch. much echo). Best items: Bach, "My, Heart Ever Faithful," Handel, "Let the Bright Seraphim Sound."

## DIRECTIONS

These numbers appear under the dashes in the column headed WORDS. There is a dash for each letter in the required word. The wey letters in the squares are for convenicnce, inare for convenicnce, indicating to which word in in the diagram belongs. When you have guessed a When you have guessed a word, fill it in on the dashes; then write each letter in the correspondingly numbered square of the puzzle diagram. When the squares are all fillea in you will find (by reading from left to right) a quotation from a famous author. Read up and down the letters mean nothing. The blacle squares indicate ends of woods; words da not necessarily end at the right side of the diagram.
When the column headWhen the column heada WORDS is flled in, the initial letters spell the name of the author and the title of the pice from which the quotation has been taken. Authority for spelling and definitions is Webster's New International Dietionary (second edition).
