Of her home in Vermont, Genevieve Taggard wrote:

Gilfeather: a name and a place and a part of Vermont. All elegy and hope—hard to say

how.

Not a family home.

It's old, house built the year of Shays' rebellion.

When we go to Gilfeather we feel Oldness and newness, the quick, the dead and the future.

These lines may have inspired the friends and neighbors who have organized themselves as the Gilfeather Associates to perpetuate the spirit of the place with which the poet's later years and writing were so closely linked. The Associates announce the establishment of the Genevieve Taggard Residence to provide annually a summer home for a young writer, painter, musician, or other creative artist who might benefit by a chance to work in the seclusion of the West River Valley. It is emphasized that

the residence will not be awarded to persons of recognized achievement but rather on the basis of potential ability.

The residence for 1949 has been given to Robert M. Adams of Rutgers University, whose essay in Accent last summer, "A Hawk and a Handsaw for Ezra Pound," won Genevieve Taggard's enthusiastic approval. While at Gilfeather this summer, Mr. Adams expects to work on a book which develops the theme of that essay, dealing with certain trends in modern poetry exemplified in Pound, Eliot, and their adherents.

The Gilfeather Associates have other projects which they are not yet prepared to announce. They take a special interest in the Genevieve Taggard Collection in the Baker Library at Dartmouth College. This collection is already rich in first editions of the poet's work, including early magazine and newspaper appearances, as well as manuscripts and other documents. So that the life and work of the poet may be supplemented by a documentary record of her no less notable career as teacher at Mt. Holyoke, Bennington, Sarah Lawrence, and elsewhere, Mrs. Catherine Osgood Foster of Bennington and Mrs. Helen Lynd of Sarah Lawrence are asking former students and colleagues to contribute letters and memoirs of the teacher for this collection. The secretary of the Gilfeather Associates is Professor Basil Rauch of Columbia University.
