# Audio Fair Forecast

# (New York, No. 4)

LL the information above points the way in which audio interest has blossomed in the brief four years since word circulated, rather uncertainly, in the fall of 1949 that something unusual was about to happen in the Hotel New Yorker. The yearly renewal establishes beyond doubt the widespread interest in the whole field: the designation locating it in New York points the fact that one has to be specific about where a particular Audio Fair is happening, for Chicago has already been initiated, and Los Angeles audiophiles will have their opportunity in February.

We congratulate the sponsors on adding a day to the previous total of three, and urge all *SR* music-lovers in the metropolitan area to set aside an hour or two on October 29, 30, 31, or November 1 for an inspection of the manifold miracles of reproduced sound in this year of 1952. We can guarantee that it will be profitable, if not uniformly pleasurable.

If any trends are evident from the sampling of exhibitor intentions it would be in the direction of "packaged sound systems." That is to say, an assemblage of superior components, grouped in graded price categories. Stromberg-Carlson is one prominent manufacturer who has entered this field, and among several others are two (H. H. Scott and Arrow Audio Center) showing complete units based on those recommended by C. G. Burke in "The Saturday Review Book of Recorded Music and Sound Reproduction."

In the following compilation of data received in response to a question-naire, an asterisk (\*) indicates those who have not previously exhibited at the New York Audio Fair. The numbers in parentheses indicate the number of years each company has been represented.

Altec-Lansing Corp. (4)—New exhibits this year include a new series of Duplex speakers designed to give greatly improved home reproduction. Also promised are new public address amplifiers and loudspeakers.

Amplifier Corporation of America (3)—New exhibits include miniature and sub-miniature battery-operated magnetic tape recorders. Among them are 7½-inch per second units, and a 15-inch per second unit.

Arrow Audio Center (3)—A complete "price-no-object" high-fidelity system based on the "Saturday Review Home Book of Recorded Music and Sound Reproduction."

Audak Company (3)—Recording cutters, tone arms, and reproducers.

New exhibits this year include a chromatic diamond polyphase reproducer and studio arms.

# BERG'S "LULU"

money are dwelt upon is all too close to life.

The high tension point is the middle of Act II, where Lulu's third husband surprises her with his son, while sundry suitors are hidden in the house. He reminds her of the tragedy her infidelity has wrought on previous husbands, and hands her a gun to shoot herself with. But she sings, in the aria already mentioned, "If men destroy themselves on my account that does not degrade me," and shoots him instead. A year elapses between this and the next scene, and a film between them shows her trial and imprisonment. (The failure to mention this in the otherwise adequate Columbia libretto may leave the listener confused at the beginning of the next scene.) This is the turning point at which Lulu yields to degradation, and as a woman of the streets sinks lower and lower until Jack-the-Ripper lures her to her death. Visitations from her dead husbands in the missing portion of the opera may conceivably provide a commentary. But in what is given, we have to provide this for the most part ourselves-after the fact, as it were. Perhaps this accounts for the sophistry of Wedekind apologists, who strive to make us believe he gave "perspective" to a "loose chain of events" that they themselves admit "might have been constructed by a cheap literary romanticist.'

As a coloratura, Lulu is a convincingly insouciant character. The fusion of ornamental style and jagged chromaticism is very original at the same time that it calls for the Utopian singer. Ilona Steingruber does some of it very well, but she sounds none too happy in the realm of high D. Friedl Riedler (the schoolboy) negotiates the skips admirably, and among the men Claus Riegler and Otto Wiener are the most sympathetic. There is an unhappy tendency to mark single tones instead of phrasing, and no doubt listeners will think this and the ungainly singing tone are prescribed by Berg's special vocal idiom. In addition to straight singing and speaking, this idiom includes various degrees between the two. But the athlete, Karl Loida, makes no differentiation among these degrees, and Hans Libert (Alwa) makes painful tenor sounds above middle C. It is good to report that the orchestral players of vibraphone and saxophone do justice to Berg's sensitive writing for these instruments.

THERE has been a remarkable musical renaissance in Japan recently, especially in Tokyo, where one or more concerts are given daily. Most of these are devoted to Western music, the standard warhorses predominating—often to the extent of one work, such as the "Pathétique," being performed by two or three orchestras within one week. Unfortunately, little music of Japanese composers is performed.

The best of the four major symphony orchestras concertizing regularly in the Tokyo area is the Konoye Symphony, founded and conducted by Hidemaro Konoye, a brilliant conductor who conducted and recorded with the Berlin Philharmonic in former years. Another excellent organization, though not comparable to the major American or European orchestras, is Radio Tokyo's NHK Symphony, which has given some fine broadcasts and concerts under Kurt Wöss's direction. Mr. Wöss, known to American collectors through his Remington recordings, is one of the few conductors to play twentieth-century music. (The other conductors—with the exception of Hideo Saito, who conducted the Tokyo Symphony in a few modern works, including Bartók's Concerto for Orchestra-have been content to remain in the well-worn path of Beethoven and Tchaikovsky.) The Tokyo Symphony is a capable orchestra; the Tokyo Philharmonic is, regrettably, not equal to any of the other three.

Yehudi Menuhin was the first foreign artist to visit Japan since the war's end and was jubilantly received by the Japanese. His phenomenal success paved the way for other artists, and Helen Traubel, the next to concertize in Japan, received a like welcome. Her warm personality, as well as her beautiful singing of lieder and operatic excerpts, endeared her to the public.

The next visitor—and most interesting to American record collectors—was the German baritone Gerhard Hüsch, who toured Japan for three months at the invitation of the Nippon Broadcasting Co. Rather than present programs of miscellaneous lieder, he sang the three Schubert lieder cycles,
