## Blood and Sand

**L**A FIESTA BRAVA—the bullfight—is the national festival of Spain, and from mid-March through the middle of October the country's approximately 350 bullrings are the scene week after week of this stirring ritual of blood, sand, and death. Mexico and Peru are also countries where the tradition of the bulls is found intact, but it is probably in Spain, cradle of bullfighting, that the "gallant spectacle" can best be observed.

Of all the Spanish festivals the most unusual undoubtedly is the Running of the Bulls at the 400-year-old Fiesta de San Fermin in Pamplona on July 7-14. For there the huge, fierce beasts are not only fought in the arena, but are run through barricaded streets from the bullpens set up in the plaza to the bullring in another part of town.

Some sort of bullfight is held in Madrid and Barcelona every Sunday and public holiday, and often on Thursdays, throughout the season. They are held on most Sundays during spring and autumn in Seville and Valencia. Among the hundreds of fights staged between March and October the following traditional fixtures stand out. Places and proposed dates for 1954 are:

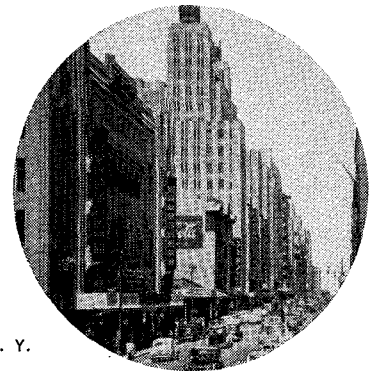

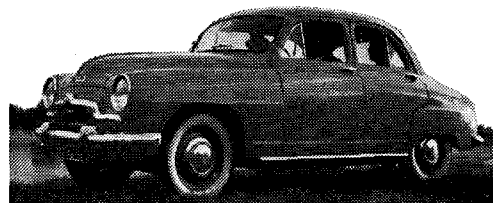
