young, and American, however, and they succeeded in talking and charming their way out of Persian jails and into a family picnic of the Shah, into a pass which the King of Afghanistan granted them to travel along the narrow, mountainous corridor of that country, and finally into the confidence of a ruthless bandit chief who terrorized a strip of high-altitude hell which separates Russia and Pakistan.

In spite of rumors that the Russians would be out to catch any Americans nosing near their border, and in spite of the twenty-thousand-foot altitude of some of the passes, the Shors succeeded in following Marco Polo's route as far as the Chinese border, where the fall of China to the Communists stopped them. Mrs. Shor's lighthearted tale of this journey is packed with sympathetic observations of peoples, customs, and landscapes, and backed up with scores of sketches, maps, and photographs. —T. E. C.

LARK IN THE CARIBBEAN: How many servicemen dreamed during the war of buying a boat when peace came and sailing off to the Caribbean? Thomas Helm and his pal Ed Booth nursed this dream while they were in the Navy, but Helm lost most of his left hand in the Pearl Harbor attack and for years was afraid to risk action in the hunting, fishing, and sailing that had been the most meaningful parts of his life. But suddenly, when he was deeply sunk in the routine of an insurance executive's job in Tampa, Florida, his old friend discovered the boat that they had always wanted, and within a few weeks Thomas Helm was off on the five-thousand-mile cruise of the Caribbean which he excitingly describes in "The Sea Lark" (A. A. Wyn, \$3.50).

Although he is ostensibly writing about a sailing voyage, the author is far more interested in the hunting and fishing that the little schooner Sea Lark made available to her two owners in and around Cuba, Haiti, Puerto Rico, Jamaica, and Honduras. Most of the excitement, therefore, comes from his accounts of such exploits as a fight with an octopus, a jaguar hunt, and his repeated and finally successful efforts to educate his useless arm to handle a rifle, a knife, and a fishing rod. Beyond the thrills of hunting and fishing not much of the author's feeling comes through. You know that he loves the Caribbean and its islands, but he cannot make this love articu-—T. E. C. late.

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
