So far I have looked in vain for any recorded music of Leopold Mozart. Does any exist? I know it is pretty useless to ever think I will hear his music in a concert hall.

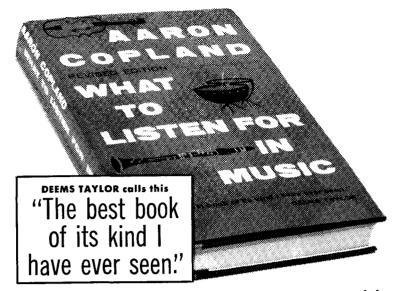
