the conduct of the Civil War, in the shaping of reconstruction and the defcating of Lincoln's moderate plans, in the impeachment of Andrew Johnson, and in the struggle for emancipation.

I would be glad if the author had offered us more of his own reaction to Sumner. Professor Donald has given us a superb piece of scholarship: a portrait through the historian's telephoto lens. To give his work equal stature as biography he must, I think, be willing to shake hands with his subject.

BACK HOME AGAIN: It is quite plain in "God's Oddling" (McGraw-Hill, S4.95), another mèlange of reminiscences of hill life in Kentucky, that Jesse Stuart has in mind as the titled character his father, Mitch Stuart, for he traces, in a series of incidents, the life of Mitch from the time of his early fatherhood on the Little Sandy to the day of his death in W-Hollow country, made familiar by Stuart's other books. Most of this one is taken up with incidents, such as mule trading and feuding, planting and harvesting, that illustrate Mitch Stuart's exhausting life.
The book, one feels, is at once an indictment of today's social security society and an almost poetic elegy to Stuart's clan-hard-working, hardfighting, hard-drinking, religious people, fiercely honest, frighteningly industrious, with a poignant smell of humanity about them.
"God's Oddling" is hard to put down, not because of any strong thread of narrative (it is merely strung together) or because of any obvious organization of biographical detail, but merely because each incident grips the reader with a sense of immediacy and import, as if the writing were not done with a typewriter, but with a stub of Kentucky sassafras or sumac-a compulsive piece that Stuart had to spew out.

Whatever verdict is rendered on Stuart as a writer (and so far he has achieved success, both critically and popularly), that verdict must necessarily take "God's Oddling" into consideration, for this is Jesse, as much as or more so than it is Mitch Stuart: one sees Mitch through Jesse's boyish, youthful, and mannish eyes; one sees the beholder more clearly than the sub)ject of his beholding. Jesse follows his father through the meager coal mines of Greenup County, the infertile fields of W-Hollow, the tiny towns of Kentucky's hills, and we have a touching portrait of an almost medieval existence in a dimly remembered America of the Twenties and Thirtics.
