A FUNDAMENTAL course in chess is to gain material with minimal risk, swap pieces, and nurse the advantage to an end-game victory. In such a sequence, the correct deployment of the king is a dominant factor.


A masterful example of progressive conversion came when Vassily Smyslov of the Soviet Union met Heinz Lehmann of West Germany at the recent Capablanca Memorial Tournament in Havana. Smyslov, a former world champion, is the victor.

By the sortie 2 P-K4, PxP - White iswilling to part with a pawn in return for superior development. The onus then would be upon him to prove that the faster deployment of his forces outweighs the pawn. But Black rejects the offer, or rather accepts and returns it.


White follows up by castling long with 14 O-O-O, and this does lose a Pawn to 15... QxP. All this is part of White's plan to place Black on the defensive.

Black finally emerges with a safe king, a pawn plus, and a chance to simplify to a pawn-plus ending, and victory.
