

Night's Evil. By Mark McShane. Crime Club. \$3.50. Slaughter of playboy puts Norman Pink, ex-English cop and now private eye, on track of traveling carnival that crosses border into Scotland, where hell breaks loose. Wispy but pleasant.

Murder by 3's. By Patricia Moyes. Introduction by Anthony Boucher. Holt, Rinehart & Winston, \$5.95. Author's first omnibus includes her memorable Dead Men Don't Ski (1960), Down Among the Dead Men (1961), and Falling Star (1964), all reciting the detection disciplines of Chief Inspector Henry Tibbett, CID, not to mention his wife, Emmy.

The World's Greatest Spies. Bu Charles Wighton. Taplinger. \$4.50. These brisk accounts of the careers of master enemy agents, real or alleged, recall names that are largely familiar (Sorge, Cicero, Abel, et al.) Author thinks Mata Hari got a raw deal.

13 Ways to Dispose of a Body. Compiled and edited by Basil Davenport. Dodd, Mead. \$4. This final anthology assembled by a connoisseur of crime literature includes stories by British and American authors wherein the protagonists who wish "that this too too solid

No Escape. By Josephine Bell. Macmillan. \$3.95. Fine hospital background makes this yarn fascinating; don't worry about drugs angle (author is English M.D. and her terminal note on addiction is highly pertinent).

Death Walks in Eastrepps. By Francis Beeding. The Man in the Corner. By Baroness Orczy. Lady Into Fox. By David Garnett. Norton. 3 Vols. \$3.95 each. This second cluster in the Seagull Library of Mystery and Suspense, all under the competent editorship of Vincent Starrett (who supplies crisp introductions), restores to circulation a full-length collaborative novel, a notable collection of short stories, and a famous novella.

The Paper Dolls. By L. P. Davies. Crime Club. \$3.95. English schoolteachers (he and she), disturbed by conduct of one of their pupils, embark on investigation that has terrifying results. A bit of an oddity, but holds up admirably. (Come again, sir.)

The Heir Hunters. By Bill S. Ballinger. Harper & Row. \$4.50. Impecunious law student, passing out handbills in Hollywood area, locates trove of bankbooks, seeks inheritors; women impede his progress (not to mention murder). Fine follow-your-nose job.

Eighty Million Eyes. By Ed McBain. Delacorte. \$3.50. TV comic does final fadeout before network audience; 87th Precinct boys, with lab's help, pin murder tag on the right wrong guy. In the groove.

A Small War Made to Order. By Norman Lewis. Harcourt, Brace & World. \$4.50. English drifter (he reviews books) enters Cuba ostensibly as Canadian left-wing journalist but actually as pre-invasion intelligence scout; finds the going real rugged (but Sloppy Joe's is still open). A suspense novel of authentic distinction.

House on Greenapple Road. By Harold R. Daniels, Random House, \$3.95. Massachusetts housewife's disappearance (how account for those seven pints of blood splashed around her kitchen?) gives capable Lt. Nalon of local cops a Grade A worrier. Excellent procedural performance.

A Candle for the Dead. By Hugh Marlowe. Abelard-Schuman. \$3.50. Irish rebel flees English prison, runs into plots and counterplots in usually quiet Wordsworthian area. Fine chase piece, with considerable rough stuff.

A Matter of Love and Death. By Tobias Wells. Crime Club. \$3.50. Miami lass, domiciled in Boston by well-heeled Back Bay couple, is accused of their murder; nice Detective Knute Severson puzzles over this one (and let's hope we see him again soon).

The Case of the Innocent Victims. By John Creasey. Scribners. \$3.95. Infant's suffocation hands Yard Super Handsome West a real toughie; adult deaths follow. A harrowing experience for all concerned, including the reader.


Criminal Conversation. By Nicolas Freeling. Harper & Row. \$4.50. Inspector van der Valk of Amsterdam police, posing unofficially as a patient, consults a physician who may be a killer. Urbane and literate, as expected.

Widows Wear Weeds. By A. A. Fair (Erle Stanley Gardner). Morrow. \$3.50. Donald Lam toils overtime to line up case in which who is blackmailing whom is problem (murder fails to clarify matters); Bertha Cool quiescent, Sgt. Sellers otherwise. Full of the old bounce, but fractured paragraphing continues to -Sergeant Cuff. annoy.
