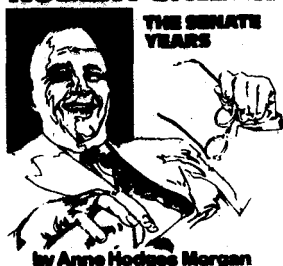

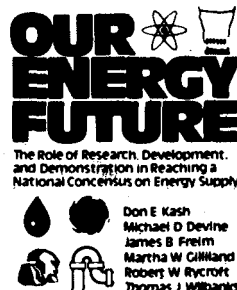

OUR ENERGY FUTURE: The Role of Research, Development, and Demonstration in Reaching a National Consensus on Energy Supply

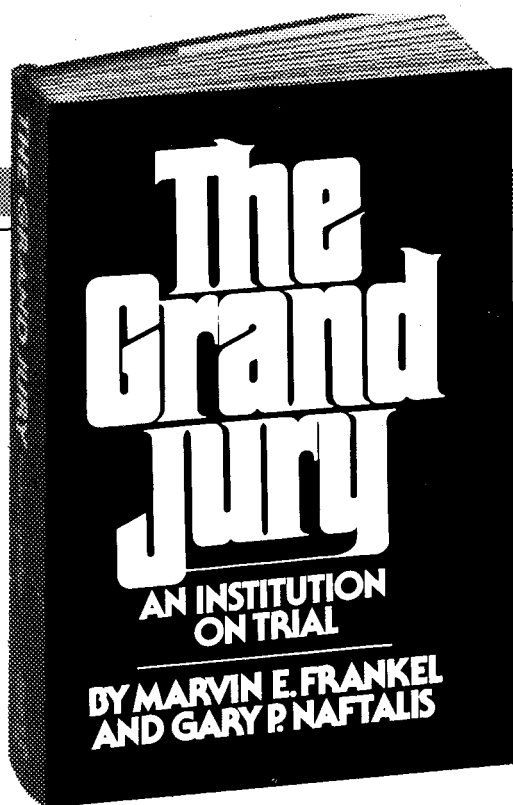
